February is Low Vision Awareness Month:

-Low vision can make it hard to do things like reading, shopping, cooking or writing. Vision rehabilitation can help people with low vision stay independent and maximize remaining vision. During February, which is Low Vision Awareness Month, help raise awareness about low vision and spread the word about Cleveland Sight Center and vision rehabilitation services. Follow CSC messaging via "In The Know," social media channels and the agency's website throughout the month for tips, tools and techniques about vision health, contrast, lighting, minimizing your risk for vision loss and more.

Educating the Community:

-The Outreach team talked with 26 2nd grade students and staff at St. Christopher School in Rocky River earlier this week. The students were divided equally into two classrooms that were equipped with cameras and monitors. Teacher Robin Seedhouse and her assistant had students ask questions about being blind and having low vision after Tom Sawyer and Alicia Howerton talked about blindness awareness. The Outreach team provided some activity materials to the class in advance of the program for the students to complete, which included writing their name under blindfold with a signature guide and filling out a "braille by sight" activity sheet. Cathy Javorsky did a phenomenal job with guide dog Rogue's outreach debut, as they presented a "Myths and Facts" session about guide dogs to the class. The kids loved Rogue's close-up shots with our second camera.

-Outreach also continued their efforts to promote CSC and with an interview on the "Our Aging World" radio program for the Lake County Council on Aging. The Outreach team will be appearing quarterly in 2021 on the radio program to promote programs and services and recruit possible clients.

Client Success: Stacia's Story

-"I noticed something was wrong with Stacia's vision when she started sitting closer and closer to the TV. I knew that no child should [have to sit that close] just to be able to see," said Carole, grandmother of Stacia.

Stacia was born sighted, but at the age of eight, her vision began to deteriorate. After 10 eye surgeries and frequent visits to the doctor, she lost vision in her right eye and has 20/400 remaining vision in her left eye due to multiple eye diseases.

Carole, a retired geriatric nurse, referred many of her patients with visual impairments to Cleveland Sight Center and that is exactly what she and her daughter, Stephanie did with Stacia.

"I referred many of my clients to Cleveland Sight Center never knowing that I would need [their services] also in my own family," she said.

Stephanie, Stacia's mom, passed away in 2019 in a fatal car accident and Carole has become Stacia's main caretaker. Carole said that Stephanie was very involved in Stacia's care and loved how Cleveland Sight Center could help her daughter.

Now, at age 12 and in seventh grade, Stacia is learning to adapt and thrive despite her vision loss. She describes her remaining vision as needing to be two feet away from a person to be able to read their shirt if there are words on it.

Stacia works with Kristen, a case manager from the Children & Young Adult Services Department who helps connect her with services, tools and technology to help maximize her remaining vision. She uses a closed circuit television (CCTV), provided through the agency's Empowerment Fund, to help her access her homework and textbooks by magnifying the print onto a large monitor.

When virtual classes began because of COVID-19, she used a small computer monitor to attend her classes. Due to the small size of the screen, she was struggling to see. Kristen recognized this and loaned her a large screen so she could succeed in her classes with the right tools and technology. Additionally, Kristen played a large role in supporting Stacia when she lost her mom in 2019.

"[Cleveland Sight Center] is a great place of acceptance. It supports you and has all the things that you need. You don't have to pretend or fake your sadness or fears. You can be vulnerable. They don't judge you and it's very supportive. They have a lot of materials that help you make friends," Boyd said.

Since becoming involved with CSC, Stacia has attended summer camp at Highbrook Lodge and various other recreation opportunities that have allowed her to make new friends.

"My favorite part about Cleveland Sight Center is the people there and the sense of self [I have gained]. I gained a sense that I had friends with the same disability as me. And it wasn't just me. I wasn't the only one picked to have this disability," Boyd said. "I have learned to accept that my disability is a part of me."

What's Happening at CSC:

-What a busy first month of 2021 for students in Bright Futures Preschool! They marked the last school day of the month on their January calendars on Thursday and also wrapped up their learning unit on bread. This week the students learned how to make bread, reviewed the letters B (bread), P (pizza) and S (snowflake, snowman, sandwich), listened to an adapted story about the Little Red Hen, learned the song "This Is the Way We Make Our Bread" and they baked bread! Each family received a "Bread in the Bag" project as well as a recording and print out with directions. The class shared their final products – baked bread – during Thursday's online session. They also made a snowman from playdough that Preschool Teacher Ms. Melissa made for each student. And what a nice surprise and cooperation from Mother Nature as it was snowing the whole morning as they completed the activity.

Items of Note:

-Rep. Mike Thompson (CA-05) and Rep. Mike Kelly (PA-16) announced the reintroduction of the Access Technology Affordability Act, a bill to ensure that blind people can afford the high-cost access technology that helps them participate in the workforce. The bill creates a refundable tax credit for blind individuals to buy things like screen readers and Braille embossers which are not normally covered by insurance that individuals need to participate in every day workplace tasks. Did you Know:
