February is Low Vision Awareness Month:

-Low vision can make it hard to do things like reading, shopping, cooking or writing. Vision rehabilitation can help people with low vision stay independent and maximize remaining vision. During February, which is Low Vision Awareness Month, help raise awareness about low vision and spread the word about Cleveland Sight Center and vision rehabilitation services. Follow CSC messaging via "In The Know," social media channels and the agency's website throughout the month for tips, tools and techniques about vision health, contrast, lighting, minimizing your risk for vision loss and more.

-Proper use of lighting makes a big difference on what and how you see. CSC staff often advise clients to keep task lighting below their eyes or behind their back in order to prevent glare.

Client Success: Jordan's Story

-Jordan is 27 years old. He has lost all of his vision, is in a wheelchair due to progressive neurological issues and he expects to lose his hearing as well. Jordan is taking Braille classes and he learned to type using the computers in the Storer Center (computer lab at CSC) and the TypeAbility program. He is now learning the JAWS (Job Access with Speech) screen reading software program. He shows great motivation and persistence and as he gains confidence he is beginning to open up and talk and think more about his future...possibly even returning to school. He states that he is very pleased with his progress and excited to move forward.

Jordan catches on to the concepts quickly and states that he is glad that he will be able to use the computer again like he could when he had vision. He also plans to learn to use a refreshable braille display to help him as his hearing decreases.

Educating the Community:

-Dr. Lidija Balciunas, Optometrist/Low Vision Specialist and Clinical Manager of the Low Vision Clinic at Cleveland Sight Center, presented to the Cleveland Ophthalmological Society meeting on Tuesday, February 9th. The presentation covered topics including the comprehensive vision rehabilitation services available at Cleveland Sight Center, what doctors' patients can expect to experience at the agency via various case studies, who might be a good candidate for Vocational Rehabilitation services and how to refer to the agency. The presentation was attended by 86 members of the Cleveland Ophthalmological Society.

-The Outreach team continues to promote CSC's brand and OOD's Independent Living Older Blind Program (ILOB) by connecting with some west side organizations including the Lorain County Office on Aging and their "The Senior Years" newspaper, which published an article this month about CSC and ILOB. -The Outreach team connected with several Home Care service providers in Lake, Medina and Summit counties about providing them with an awareness information toolkit about blindness and low vision for their in-home caregiver staff and received positive feedback. The Medina/Summit Home Care Service also invited CSC into their inner circle network. The team responded to the invitation by providing a link to a recent video interview on cable as their introduction to the group and provided support materials that included the Independent Living Older Blind (ILOB) Program Fact Sheet, CSC Agency Overview and Referral Post Card.

Manager of Preschool Services Dorota Tomaszewska and her daughter made heart-shaped cookies that had frosting and hard candies placed on top that spelled the word "love" in Braille. The cookies were delivered to each student by Preschool Teacher Melissa Kraus. The students were able to count using the cookies, learn about Braille and enjoy the tactile treats! The preschoolers continued learning about pets this week including how pets make us feel. The students learned how to spell "love", played and sang "Peek-a-Boo I Love You" with each other and with pets – including the real pets some students have at home and their stuffed animal pets.

-The Eyedea Shop is very excited to introduce one of the store's newer items: the LED Headband Magnifier. It is an adjustable head-mounted device that can be worn in lieu of using a handheld magnifier to enable you to be hands-free while you read, craft, repair or do whatever close-detailed work you need to see magnified. It has an LED light which can be detached from the device and used separately if need be. The single magnifying plates come in the following sizes: 1.0X, 1.5X, 2.0X, 2.5X and 3.5X. The plates can be doubled up to reach magnification of 3.0X, 4.0X, 4.5X, 5.0X, 5.5X and 6.0X! The LED light shines right where it's needed and has a long life. No additional bulb change is necessary. The device runs on two AAA batteries, which are included and the magnification plates can be stored in a carrying case provided. The price is \$50.00.

In case you missed it last week, check out the Mobile Phone Screen Amplifier/Magnifier! There is a new photo of the magnifier and smartphone below. It is a collapsible device that when opened will enlarge the viewing screen on a smartphone. When collapsed it is about the size of a small handheld tablet and is very lightweight. It can magnify a smartphone screen 3 to 4 times for enhanced viewing. It holds the phone at a nice angle for viewing and eliminates radiation, if that is a concern. Your smartphone is viewed in a landscape position and can be used when watching movies, YouTube videos or when using FaceTime. The cost in the store is \$22.00.

Items of Note:

-The next meeting of the Board of Trustees will be Monday, February 22nd at 12:00 p.m.

- -The Facilities team has been making general improvements to the grounds and buildings at Highbrook Lodge this offseason, including new flooring and tiles in the Smith Lodge. They have also been replacing light bulbs in many areas of the main building at CSC to improve lighting in hallways, stairwells and work stations.
- -Self-driving cars will offer access to ride-sharing and ride-hailing with their suite of modern conveniences. However, many people with visual impairments who use these services rely on a human driver to safely locate their vehicle.

A research group led by the Virtual Environments and Multimodal Interaction Laboratory (VEMI Lab) at the University of Maine is developing a smartphone app that provides the navigational assistance needed for people with disabilities and seniors to enjoy ride-sharing and ride-hailing, collectively termed mobility-as-a-service, with the latest in automotive technology. The app, known as the Autonomous Vehicle Assistant (AVA), can also be used for standard vehicles operated by human drivers and enjoyed by everyone.

AVA will help users request, find and enter a vehicle using a multisensory interface that provides guidance through audio and haptic feedback and high-contrast visual cues. The Autonomous Vehicle Research Group (AVRG), a cross institutional collective led by VEMI lab with researchers from Northeastern University and Colby College, will leverage GPS technology, real-time computer vision via the smartphone camera and artificial intelligence to support the functions offered through the app.
