
What's Happening at CSC:



- -Did you know you can use speech and sound schemes so JAWS will alert you to changes on the screen, such as using a deeper voice for bold text? If you have a creative scheme and want to share it with fellow JAWS users, consider taking part in the Freedom Scientific Speech and Sound Schemes Contest*!

What Are Speech and Sound Schemes? Speech and sound schemes enable you to identify elements of Web pages, dialog boxes, and documents using voices, spoken text, or sounds. They allow you to minimize speech while navigating so you can comprehend information more quickly. For example, you might use piano notes to indicate different heading levels in a document or on a web page. You can store these speech and sound associations as a scheme and apply them at any time. Easily switch between schemes using the keyboard.
