Educating the Community:

-Katie Lepis (Vision Rehabilitation Therapist) presented to two groups of residents and family members at the Emerald Village senior living facility this week. This was the first in a series of four presentations to the groups discussing adaptive equipment, techniques, Cleveland Sight Center resources and programs, as well as strategies for coping with vision loss. Participants tested out adaptive equipment and held engaging conversations with each other about their own experiences with vision loss.

-Tom Sawyer (Outreach Specialist) gave two presentations to independent living and assisted living residents and staff members at Vitalia North Olmsted this week, highlighting CSC programs and services, upcoming CSC events and the Opportunities for Ohioans with Disabilities (OOD) Independent Living Older Blind (ILOB) and Group Independent Living programs. Tom will also be staffing a table to promote CSC programs, services and the upcoming Vision Fair for Seniors at an event this Saturday at Upper Edgewater Park for the Foundation Fighting Blindness.

In addition, as a CSC member representative of ADA Cleveland, Tom is part of their Events Committee that met this week for an onsite planning meeting on Public Square in preparation for an ADA Cleveland – Call to Action event being planned for a to-be-announced date in early fall. ADA Cleveland is a coalition of agencies and organizations from Greater Cleveland who share in the mission to provide greater access and opportunity for individuals with disabilities.

Items of Note:

-According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), more than 3.4 million Americans aged 40 years and older are blind (having a visual acuity of 20/200 or less or a visual field on 20 degrees or less) or visually impaired (having a visual acuity of 20/40 or less). Other estimates of "vision problems" range as high as 21 million, and a total of 80 million Americans have potentially blinding eye diseases. The major causes of vision loss are cataracts, age-related macular degeneration, diabetic retinopathy, and glaucoma.
