Annual Educators Workshop Scheduled for August 11th:

-Cleveland Sight Center and the Children & Young Adult Services team hosts the annual Workshop for Educators at Cleveland Sight Center on Thursday, August 11th. The workshop is designed for professionals (general education, intervention specialists, administrators, therapists, and support staff) who will be working with children with low vision, cortical visual impairment and/or blindness during the 2022-23 school year. The presentations and topics are aimed to equip educators with the knowledge, resources and strategies to help them meet their students' needs. The event will begin with a general introduction and overview of working with students with low vision and blindness. Areas of the expanded core curriculum will be introduced, along with information about recreational, pre-employment and transitional services for students with low vision and blindness. 

-Data visualizations on the web are largely inaccessible for blind and low-vision individuals who use screen readers, an assistive technology that reads on-screen elements as text-to-speech. This excludes millions of people from the opportunity to probe and interpret insights that are often presented through charts, such as election results, health statistics and economic indicators. Researchers have created prototypes that enable screen-reader users to quickly and easily navigate through multiple levels of information in an online chart.
