What's Happening at CSC:

-Cleveland Sight Center's Board of Trustees held their final meeting of 2020 on Monday, December 14th. The Board reviewed, voted on and approved the agency's operating and capital budgets for the 2021 year. Thanks to the Fiscal team and all departments for their hard work in forecasting the upcoming 12 months and preparing the 2021 budgets.


-Susie Meles, Jennifer Dean, Nicole Kahn and Kristen Callahan met with educators from a local school district this week. Jennifer gave a demonstration of JAWS over Zoom. Nicole and Jennifer explained different types of assistive technology available for students of all ages. The educators said they were excited to tell families about the different options. A follow-up meeting is expected in January.

-CSC Case Manager in Social Work Anthony Griffin, MSSA presented a workshop to staff members on the topic "Client Crisis" this week. Topics covered included "What is a crisis?" and "What to do when talking with a client in crisis." Different scenarios of people in crisis were role-played and talked through. 


Image of a screen shot of a preschool student waving to Elf Ally during their Zoom session Image of a screen shot of Santa's recordings to the preschool class

- -The BlindShell Classic is an accessible cell phone for people who are blind or visually impaired. With physical keyboard and more than 30 applications and functions, the creators have integrated the most useful functions of a smartphone into a phone that is simple and user-friendly!

 Overview of the BlindShell Classic Smartphone:
- · Accessible mobile phone for individuals who are blind or have visual impairments
- There is a large LCD screen with a keypad below it consisting of large, tactile buttons
- Basic phone functions include calling, one-touch speed dials, SMS texts, email, notes, alarm, timer, and a calendar
- Other available functions include:
- o Object tagging
- o MP3 player
- o FM radio
- o YouTube
- o SOS Button

And much more

- Users can press the physical SOS button (for 3 seconds) if they need help from their emergency contact o This emergency contact is customizable
- More than 30 applications and functions built-in to the smartphone
- Users can control the phone with their voice using simple commands
- o Please note this feature requires an internet connection
- o Users can dictate texts, emails, notes, and more
- Feedback is provided by a built-in synthetic voice, vibrations, and additional signals
- Instead of charging the phone with a standard charging cable, this phone comes with a Charging Cradle (dock) which you simply place your phone on to charge

- -The Human Language and Accessibility Technologies (HULAT) research group at the Universidad Carlos III de Madrid (UC3M) has developed and validated a mobile application that allows people with visual impairments to enjoy Christmas lights in the city of Madrid. The free "Accessible Christmas" app is available for Android and iOS and uses a system of audio descriptions assigned to different streets which tells you what you are looking at each time. It starts to work automatically when the user activates the app's geolocation system. Once the system is activated, the audio description plays, sharing information about the scenes represented in the lights, colors, and the feelings transmitted, as well as additional information about how it was created.
