CSC Receives Grant from Thomas H. White Foundation:

The Thomas H. White Foundation recently awarded a grant of \$14,700 to CSC. The Foundation focuses its grant making in education and human services, specifically in supporting programs that address workforce readiness, school retention, and early childhood enhancement in Cleveland, Ohio. The grant dollars will be allocated to CSC's Early Intervention services.

Educating and Engaging the Community:

On Wednesday, Lisa Cellura and Jane Arnoff Logsdon visited Case Western Reserve University to meet the new leadership team of Case for Sight and discuss CSC's programs and services. Alicia Howerton concludes the week with a tour of the agency for Kaley Futty, who is also completing a practicum with Susie Meles.

It's Summertime in CYAS:

- Bright Futures Summer Day Camp began this week with seven youngsters participating in this five-week program. Elements of the program include occupational therapy, physical therapy, speech, teaching of the visually impaired, and orientation & mobility, which concludes on July 14th.
- Let's welcome the 2016 Summer Youth Work Experience (SYWE) team, new staff members and program participants! SYWE is a summer transitional program for young adults ages 16 22 who are blind or have low vision. It is a five-week residential program providing a paid work experience, instruction in job readiness and "soft skills", one-on-one or small group instruction in the areas of orientation & mobility, computer skills, and activities of daily living. For most participants, this program is his or her first real job and first opportunity to experience independent living. The program, which runs through July 15th, has 12 participants.

Items of Note:

 Deborah Ruffin attended the Medicaid Policy Community Forum on Friday, June 10th at the Global Center for Health Innovation in downtown Cleveland, in which upcoming changes to Medicaid beginning in August 2016 were presented. Among them are highlighted below:

Resigning Disability Determination

- CSC client groups that may be affected: 65yrs older / Blind / Disable (Medicaid ABD Population)
- o Spend-down option will no longer exist as of August 1st 2016
- Possible changes may occur to Medicaid ID #'s
- The income threshold for ABD Medicaid will be increased and individuals will no longer have the ability to spend-down their income to become financially eligible

- Individuals exceeding the income limit will be referred to the FFM (Federally-Facilitated Marketplace) to shop for coverage
- ABD Medicaid Income Limits Effective 8-1-16: Individual \$733 and Couple \$1,100
- Individuals who do not meet the new eligibility criteria will be addressed during their renewal with their Case Worker
- Medicaid conversion will begin July 29-31
