Update on Construction and Road Work:

On Tuesday, September 8th crews began restricting Chester Avenue to one lane in each direction at East 105th Street for approximately two weeks for installation of an underground electrical vault. In addition, East 105th Street between Chester Avenue and Euclid Avenue will be reduced to one lane in each direction during off peak hours for the same operation.

 For those heading towards <u>Highbrook Lodge</u>, Aquilla Road between State Route 322 and Butternut Road in Geauga County will close on or about September 14th for 30 days. The closure is necessary for road improvement and to replace cross culverts, according to a news release from the Geauga County Engineer's Office. No traffic will be maintained.

• Former Board Trustee Jonathan Lass, MD will present "The Eye of the Artist" on Wednesday, October 14th as part of the Anton and Rose Zverina Lecture Series at Case Western Reserve University. His talk will explore the impact of various eye diseases (dacryocystitits, cataract, retinal degeneration, macular degeneration) upon famous artists and the impact of those diseases on their style and productivity, changing the history of art. The artists to be discussed include Pissaro, Monet, Degas and O'Keefe. The talk begins at 6:00pm, followed by a reception in the Dittrick Museum gallery.
