## **Educating the Community:**

-Melissa Mauk and Bobbie Szabo recently made presentations to the Forum for Volunteer Administrators (FVA), a group of volunteer professionals whose members have been influential in the field of volunteer administration in Northeast Ohio since the 1940s. FVA offers professional development workshops, programs and an annual conference designed to address the needs of those who work with and engage volunteers. Meaningful networking opportunities provide a venue for members to engage each other with innovative ideas and solutions to the ever-changing face of volunteer administration. -Tom Sawyer met with and gave a tour to Ophthalmology Intern Patrick G. from Summa Akron, discussing ways CSC staff members provide help to people with vision loss or blind so they can realize their full potential. They also talked about patients who receive low vision care while receiving medical treatment can make a huge difference in treating the whole person and not just their medical diagnosis or disease.

# Check Out What's Happening at CSC:

-The Share the Vision (STV) program began training for program volunteers earlier this week. A group of 10 Share the Vision volunteers participated and were very engaged and asked good questions. Moreed Kamal led the training, which included questions for discussion such as "What makes a good STV volunteer?", "What is the role of a STV volunteer?" and "What topics should a STV volunteer steer away from?" Moreed also led the group in discussions about confidentiality, setting appropriate boundaries with STV participants, what to do if a STV participant talks about harming themselves and what to do if the STV participant proposes a question or situation the STV volunteer does not know the answer to. ### Halloween at Highbrook Details

Dates and Times: Celebration Day: October 31st, 2020. Resort Day: November 1st, 2020. Activities from 11:00 a.m. – 4:00 p.m. Please arrive 20–30 minutes early so that everyone can be registered and begin the schedule promptly.

Cost: \$5 per person, to be paid upon arrival at camp.

Food: Lunch and light refreshments will be provided.

Costumes: Please come to camp wearing a costume for the costume party!

<u>Transportation:</u> Transportation from Cleveland Sight Center to Highbrook Lodge will not be available due to COVID-19; transportation to camp is the responsibility of the camper and camper's family.

<u>Support:</u> Due to COVID-19, we are limiting the amount of CSC staff and volunteers at these events. We ask that campers who require sighted guide and other additional assistance bring a Support Person with them—whether that is a family member, friend, or health care worker. The Support Person must also register for the event.

<u>COVID-19 Prevention Policies:</u> All campers and Support Staff will be required to wear a mask at all times throughout the event except when eating. Temperatures will be checked upon arrival. Space is very limited for these day trips to ensure that we can adhere to strict 6-foot + social distancing, so register ASAP!
