Engaging the Community and Strengthening Partnerships:

- Barb Piascik, Randy Knapp and Erin St. Denis shared information about Cleveland Sight Center and sold products from the Eyedea Shop to seniors at the Low Vision Fair at Independence Village in Avon Lake this week. Randy Knapp and Erin St. Denis then presented "An Introduction to Low Vision Accessibility Features of a Smart Phone." Did you know CSC provides iPhone training for low vision accessibility features and an advanced training for Voice Over? Look for introductory Android training coming soon!
- Another group of architects, designers and marketers bidding on the new library project on Martin Luther King, Jr Boulevard visited CSC this week for a tour and accessibility walkthrough to learn more about making the library on accessible for those who are blind or have low vision. They also conducted some interviews on considerations to make the facility accessible.
- Two students from Independence High School received a perfect score in an "Educator's Rising" competition, which is a national, performance-based event where teenagers who aspire to teach demonstrate their knowledge, skills, and leadership in the field of education. There are many areas in which to compete including lesson planning, public speaking and children's literature. Students Maddie Fichter and Abbey Bugaj chose to write and illustrate a book for the K-3rd grade literature category. There were many rules they had to follow such as the cost for printing and binding had to be under \$25 for 16 pages. The book also had to be written in English as well as a second language. Maddie wanted the second language of the book to be Braille for the visually impaired. After persistent phone calls to the judges, they accepted Braille as the book's second language. In the 27 years that this contest has been held, this is the first time anyone has created a Braille book. The students have been working with Jennifer Dean in CSC's Braille department and recently visited CSC with their entire class where they also got to tour and visit CSC's education department with Sylvia Snyder. - Thanks to the students from Case Western Reserve University who assisted with cleaning the PREP room on Friday, April 27th. Students helped check for expired food items and worked to clean out the refrigerator as well as the counters and sinks in the PREP room.
- A group of 52 volunteers from Direct Energy helped out at Highbrook Lodge on Tuesday, May 1st with tasks including removing wallpaper, painting, raking, trail maintenance, repairing picnic tables and prepping on-the-go game cards for staff to use with campers.
