Calling All Artists:

• Are you or do you know an artist who has blindness or low vision? Submissions are now being accepted for artwork to be on the cover of some of CSC's 2016 Holiday Cards! Please submit entries to Barbara Piascik in the Eyedea Shop by September 1st, 2016. Entries will be presented to a selection committee and are limited to two (2) per artist. If original artwork is not submitted, high resolution images of the artwork will be accepted. Artwork that is selected for Holiday Cards will be displayed in the Eyedea Shop and in the main lobby at CSC with the option to be sold. Interested buyers will be directed to the artist. Artwork that is not selected will be returned to artist.

CSC's Annual Budget:

• CSC is starting its budget process for fiscal year 2017. The budget helps CSC track how much money we have, how much we need to spend, and how much we need to bring in to meet business goals. A budget includes revenues (examples include Contributions, Fundraising, Fee for Service, Endowment Income, Beneficial Trust Income, Retail Sales, Grants, and more), expenses (Salaries and Employees Benefits, Professional and Contract Fees, Supplies, Occupancy Expenses, Transportation and Staff Travel, and others) and capital expenses (items that have a useful life of more than a year, for example, vehicles, building improvement, computer servers, etc.).

CSC's Budget Process is as follows:

- 1. Fiscal Management (FM) prepares the capital budget (with assistance of IT and Facilities Directors)
- 2. FM produces a first pass of the budget expenses

- 3. FM requests help from Directors for the projected revenues of departments
- 4. FM meets and firms up departmental budgets with Directors/Managers
- 5. FM reviews the fiscal year 2017 consolidated budget with CSC President Larry Benders
- 6. FM reviews the fiscal year 2017 consolidated budget with Board Treasurer Wally Anders
- 7. FM presents the fiscal year 2017 consolidated budget to Budget and Finance Committee for 1) Budget Review and 2) Recommendation for Approval to Board of Trustees (Meeting is September 8, 2016)
- 8. Budget and Finance Committee presents the fiscal year 2017 consolidated budget for approval to the Board of Trustees (Meeting is September 12, 2016)

• Check out this article on Katie Scheutzow's "Banking for the Blind" prototype through the Scratch Foundation. Earlier this year, Katie coded a software program that can help those who are blind or have low vision bank at ATMs by using basic hand motions. The program uses video sensing technology and audio prompts to carry out tasks such as making a deposit, withdrawing money, and checking a balance. Katie is a student at St. Ambrose school in Brunswick and will be spending a week at CSC in August as an intern with Randy Knapp.
