Dr. Woodson has a PhD from UCLA in music and has presented student programs for over 30 years and professional development workshops for over 25 years and has done work nationally and internationally.

Eyedeas Shop's Featured Product of the Week: Omni Reader

-The Omni Reader is one of the newest items at the Eyedeas Shop this summer. The Omni Reader is actually a scanner with optical character recognition (OCR). By pressing one button the Omni Reader reads printed text to you. You can follow the magnified text on the high contrast colored built in screen or just sit back and listen as the Omni Reader reads it aloud to you. It's lightweight and portable and has a built-in handle for easy carrying to another room, the office or anywhere else you go. The Omni Reader has large colored easy-to-use buttons/controls, several language options and a headphone jack for private listening.



Items of Note

-Just announced! Aira, a service that connects people who are blind or low-vision to highly trained, remotely-located agents, is free every day for short calls. Through an app on your smartphone or through an optional pair of Horizon Smart Glasses, Aira delivers instant access to visual information at the touch of a button -enhancing everyday efficiency, engagement and independence. Aira is still a subscription service, but now offering this option.

-A new voice assistant that improves internet browsing for people with visual impairments has been developed by researchers at the University of Waterloo in Ontario, Canada. The tool, dubbed Voice Exploration, Retrieval and Search (VERSE), was created in collaboration with Microsoft and researchers at the University of Washington to merge the best elements of existing voice assistants. The result, the researchers claim, is that VERSE is able to make free-form web searches easier than competing systems.

-Service dogs in Canada caught a performance of "Billy Elliot: The Musical" as part of their training last week. Laura MacKenzie, owner of K-9 Country Inn Working Service Dogs, where the animals are being trained, explained to CBC Radio how the theater "gives us the opportunity to expose the dogs to different stimuli such as lights, loud noises and movement of varying degrees."
