The Supported Employment/Individualized Placement and Support (SE/IPS) program had a follow-up meeting with <u>Avtron Aerospace</u>, Inc. on April 30th. Avtron Aerospace manufactures aircraft test equipment, specializing in the testing of electrical, electronic and hydraulic systems. All members of the SE/IPS team visited Avtron's site in Independence to learn the specific job duties required of assemblers. Avtron is committed to working with CSC and hiring individuals who have disabilities.

Jennifer Dean and Alexis Vinick visit the <u>Defense Finance and Accounting Services (DFAS)</u> located in downtown Cleveland's Anthony J. Celebrezze Federal Building on Friday, May 1st. DFAS is an agency of the <u>United States Department of Defense</u> that provides finance and accounting services for the civil and military members of the Department. DFAS-Cleveland reached out to CSC for a worksite assessment for a new employee who has a vision impairment. This is a great opportunity to build a relationship with a potential employer of CSC clients.

Also on May 1st, CSC and grant writing partner <u>Grants Plus</u> submit a grant proposal to <u>The Abington Foundation</u>, which was established to support organizations that promote education, health care, economic independence and cultural activities primarily in Cuyahoga County. The proposal is for funding to support the peer mentor position, a vital component in CSC's evidence-based Supported Employment/Individualized Placement and Support (SE/IPS) model and helps CSC maintain fidelity.

On Monday, May 11th the Supported Employment/Individualized Placement and Support (SE/IPS) team will attend the Bureau of Services for the Visually Impaired (BSVI) staff meeting at the Opportunities for Ohioans with Disabilities (OOD) Lakewood office. The meeting will provide a forum to discuss services and provide feedback. This is a great opportunity for CSC to promote effective collaboration with OOD, the major funder of our vocational rehabilitation services, and a partner of CSC for decades.

CARF Corner:

<u>CARF</u> is the Commission on Accreditation of Rehabilitation Facilities and its mission is to promote the quality, value and optimal outcomes of services through a consultative accreditation process and continuous improvement services that center on enhancing the lives of persons served.

Over the next weeks, four parts of Performance Improvement will be reviewed.

Performance Improvement – Important Points and Questions (Part 1):

The best organizations are dynamic and responsive to the needs of their customers. What is your system for tracking the results of your services in the lives of persons served? Is follow-up information collected to assess long-term benefits of services? After all, the ultimate measure of quality services is the impact of those services on the quality of life of the person served.

Applications for the Joseph Roeder Assistive Technology Scholarship are now available on the NIB website by clicking here. The scholarship provides a one-time award of \$2,500 for an individual who is blind to pursue education in computer science, information systems or a related field leading to a career in access technology. Applications and supporting documents must be submitted online no later than Friday, May 29, 2015 and the winner will be announced in June 2015.

The scholarship is named for Joe Roeder, senior access technology specialist at NIB from 1997 until his death in 2010. Roeder was instrumental in the development of the Section 508 electronic and information technology accessibility standards of the Rehabilitation Act, which require all federal government agencies to provide accessible data and information for employees with disabilities.
